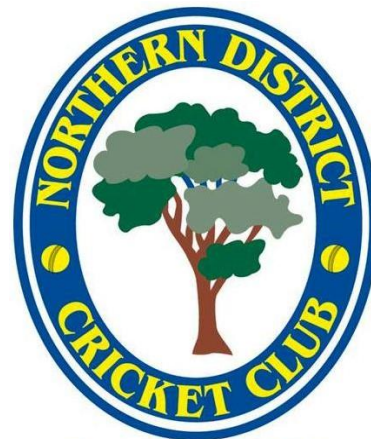

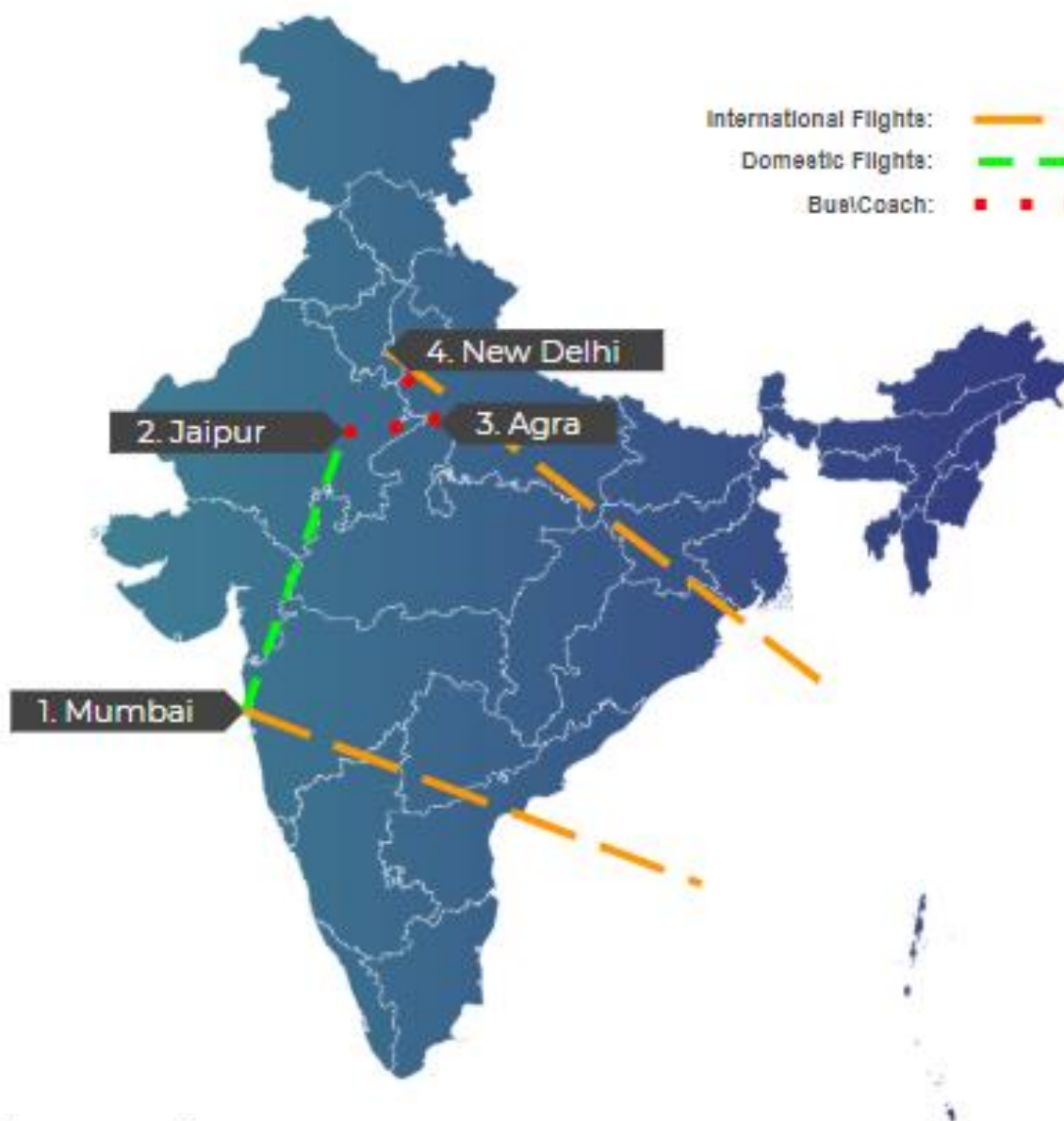

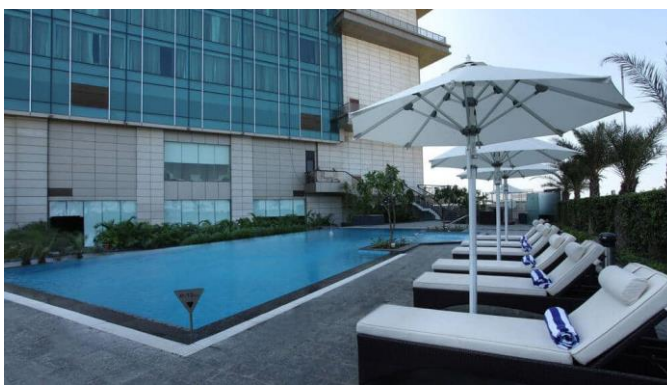

This U/15 cricket tour to India was organised by the Hornsby, Ku-ring-gai & Hills District Cricket **Coaches' Association** Inc. (HKHDCCA), in partnership with Northern District CC (NDCC) in Sydney. The touring party comprised 13 players, 3 officials and 12 family supporters (total 28 people). Our travel agent was **Kevin Tyler** from **Calypso Destinations** P/L – www.calypsodestinations.com.au, who took us to Sri Lanka in 2015. Rod Hokin (Head Coach) is a Cricket Australia Level 3 High Performance Coach, which is the highest level of accreditation achievable internationally for a cricket coach. Rod is the Coaches' Association's Head Coach; The Kings School 1st XI Coach and TKS Director of Cricket. In his school role, he oversees a coaching program involving 35 teams and 56 coaches. He has had experience coaching at Australian National Championships working with the NSW Under 15 team. From 2014 to 2017, Rod was the NDCC U/16 AW Green Shield Coach and led the team to successive Minor Premierships. His Coaches' Association role sees him responsible for designing and implementing junior cricket clinics in Sydney during the school holidays; off-season development programs for junior club and representative players; specialist coaching on skills development, and maintaining the professional coaching standards. He was previously Head Coach at Clontarf Cricket Club in Ireland for 5 seasons, where he was responsible for co-ordinating the coaching of seven Men's teams, two Ladies teams and 400 youth players. During his playing days, Rod played First Grade at Northern District CC and Gordon Grade clubs in Sydney, as well as for Clontarf CC in Ireland. Throughout his playing career, he achieved an amazing 38 centuries. Rod is a talented cricket coach and communicator who has been coaching full-time in Australia and overseas for 15 years. He is also a very experienced private coach who has worked individually with hundreds of rep. players over the years. Rod won HKHDCCA's prestigious *Coach of Year* award (Bruce Wood Cup) in 2016-17. Rod is a proud Life Member of both the Clontarf Cricket Club in Ireland and the Coaches' Association in Sydney.



Bruce Wood (Tour Manager / President Coaches' Association / Umpire) is a highly experienced Level 2 accredited cricket coach, having coached club, representative and touring teams since 1997-98. Bruce's HK&HDCA Weblin Shield rep. team had a magnificent season in 2005-06, going through the competition undefeated and winning the NSWDCU U/15 championship. He established Sydney's first district Cricket Coaches' Association in 2010, which is responsible for implementing a wide range of coaching initiatives in north-western Sydney, including junior cricket clinics during the school holidays, and off-season Rising Stars development programs for club and rep. players. He has coached rep. teams on tours to participate in NSW regional carnivals and overseas (India – 2006; New Zealand – 2007). He was the Manager (and umpire) on the HKHDCCA / NDCC U/15 tours to Sri Lanka in 2015 and West Indies in 2017. The Association's prestigious *Coach of Year* annual perpetual trophy (Bruce Wood Cup) is named in his honour in recognition of his exemplary work and achievements in the field of cricket coaching over two decades. Bruce is also an experienced NSWCUA Level 2 qualified umpire who has officiated in 450 matches since 2001-02, including 50+ Finals (one at the SCG and one at Bradman Oval, Bowral). Bruce is a respected Life Member of four cricket bodies – HK&HDCA; Coaches' Association (refer – bit.ly/BGW-LM-2017), Barker CC; and Normanhurst-Warrawee CC.



Josh Miller (HKHDCCA Secretary / Tour Treasurer / Assistant Coach) is responsible for managing the finances on tour and performing the role of Assistant Coach. Josh is a professional cricket coach running a private coaching business. He graduated from Sydney University with a Bachelor of Exercise and Sports Science degree in 2014, and is a Level 2 accredited cricket coach. Josh is a local product who played representative cricket for HK&HDCA in juniors as well as AW Green Shield at Northern District CC. He then progressed into Grade cricket, playing through the grades, including a First Grade debut in 2017-18. Along the way he was part of a Second Grade premiership, and two Third Grade Premierships. He has displayed strong leadership skills, captaining Weblin and Watson Shield sides in junior reps, a Ross Turner Cup side, the Mt Colah A Grade side when only 18, as well as captaining NDCC lower grade sides. Josh has recorded a number of impressive cricket coaching achievements in recent years, including winning the 2018-19 AW Green Shield premiership (undefeated), and assisting Rod with the Kings School 1st XI, winning the GPS premiership twice in the last three seasons. He has also coached four years of HK&HDCA junior representative cricket; Glenn Hourigan and Ross Turner Cup sides; and has been a regular coach at the junior clinics and off-season development programs run by HKHDCCA since 2012. Josh won HKHDCCA's prestigious *Coach of Year* award (Bruce Wood Cup) in 2013-14.

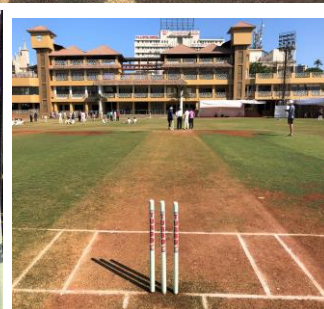

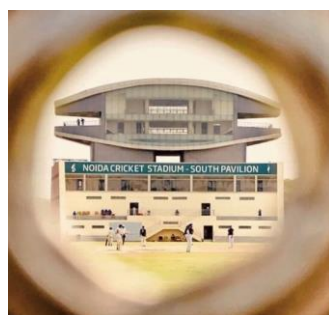

1	Ryan Swain (Captain)	Our Captain on tour led from the front in all aspects of the tour. His outstanding leadership qualities shone through both on and off the field. All our players looked up to him as a person. He did well managing his captaining with outstanding keeping at times and some promising innings with the bat. It was a pleasure to have Ryan leading the team on tour.
2	Anthony Bartlett	As a top-order batter, Anthony developed significantly on tour and his two 50s showed his excellent ability to bat well in difficult conditions. He loves the game of cricket and his ability to lead the energy in the field and bowl handy medium pace shows his all-round cricketing ability. He will no doubt have plenty of success moving forward.
3	Felix Booth	Felix had a number of excellent individual performances on tour and his ability to strike the ball clean was clearly evident. His 45 not out included some powerful hitting and changed the momentum of the game. His medium pace bowling was also effective and it was pleasing to see Felix display his all-round ability during the tour.
4	Nick Hook	A big turning leg spin bowler and technically correct top order batter Nick contributed in a number of ways on tour. At times he bowled exceptional spells and took crucial wickets. With the bat his running between wickets was a highlight. He was also our most valuable fielder with his energy and anticipation in the circle outstanding.
5	Oliver Jennings	Oliver had an exceptional tour and was our leading wicket-taker with 9 wickets at the impressive average of 10.4 (BB 4/21). He spun the ball considerably and his consistency was superb. He received limited opportunities with the bat but showed himself to be technically correct and difficult to dismiss. His 53 showed his ability to score of both pace and spin bowlers.
6	Avi Lath	One of our most energetic and passionate cricketers both on and off the field. When he was not leading our bowling attack, he was in the kitchen getting ice-cream for the boys or making dinner arrangements. His ability to vary his pace showed through some excellent spells at the death. He showed plenty of promise also when he opened the batting and got us off to a positive start.
7	Will McFadden	A batsman with outstanding potential, his best innings of 56 on tour was full of excellent footwork to spin and positive intent to score through powerful hitting and excellent running between the wickets. One of our best fielders, Will is a cricketer who offers plenty. He spins his leggies big and will hopefully be an outstanding all-rounder in years to come.
8	Jack Nati	It was a pleasure to have Jack on tour. His contribution both on and off the field was immense and he is a player who adds plenty to any team. His 68 in Match 6 was a powerful innings which nearly led us to an excellent victory. With the ball he always competed in tough conditions. Around the team Jack was excellent and showed the importance of always putting the team first.
9	Marcus Ridley	Another all-rounder on tour Marcus contributed well with both bat and ball. His bowling spells often included crucial wickets and he also threatened to get good batsmen out. He was also patient with the bat and was difficult to dismiss. Marcus showed potential in many areas and will no doubt have success moving forward.
10	Abhi Singh	Abhi is a leg spin bowler and technically correct left-handed batter. His leg spin was threatening at times and he showed his ability to bowl wicket taking balls. With the bat he used his feet well and looked to be positive against the spinners. He will no doubt benefit from the experience of playing in India and hopefully thrive in the season ahead.
11	Cameron Tunks	Our leading run scorer on tour Cameron managed 217 runs at an average of 54. His batting is technically excellent and he showed his class a number of times on the tour. His ability to play of both the front and back foot was a highlight. With the ball and in the field, Cameron also showed his class and he is clearly a player destined to play at a higher level.
12	Alistair Weston	Alistair has the ability to change a game of cricket very quickly and he did this with both bat and ball at times on tour. His 58 not out in our first game was a great example of some counter attacking batting. With the ball he has genuine pace and he is an exciting prospect in the season and years to come.
13	Spencer White	Spencer is without doubt an extremely talented cricketer and he showed this with both bat and ball on the tour. He ended up our 2 nd leading run scorer and wicket-taker with 195 runs at 49 and 7 wickets. He will benefit greatly from the tour and is an all-round prospect who is one to watch this season.



Captain's Report (Ryan Swain)

As we took our first breath of air walking off the plane, we were hit with an immediate wave of heat and humidity, a sudden realisation that after the many months of preparation and lead up for this tour, we were finally here. A short bus trip to the hotel saw our jet-lagged touring group eager to get some rest in preparation for the training session the next day.

On Day 2, we headed to our training session at the Al-Barkaat Malik Muhammad Islam English School, where we were greeted with a team of boys, dressed in their whites, ready to provide a quality training session for our touring side. This was great, as we were not only able to familiarise ourselves with the subcontinental conditions but also talk to and learn from the Indian boys that we were going to play against the following day. Later in the day, we travelled to see the Gateway of India, a great sandstone structure, which had been there since 1919.



As we drove into the DY Patil University the next day, we were amazed to see the beautiful stadium and grounds that the University had to offer. As we pulled up to our ground, a mix of excitement and nerves were present throughout the bus. After losing the toss and being sent in to bat, the loss of early wickets had our touring side in trouble. A few key partnerships as well as some stand out performances such as Cam Tunks 53 and Alistair Weston 58no, saw us end up with the total 8/178. After lunch, our side came out with a burst of energy, our first 20 overs saw plenty of buzz from the boys. Unfortunately, the talented opposition was able to chase the total down to win by 4 wickets.

When we arrived at the Dadaji Kondadev Stadium for our second game the next day, we were amazed to see hundreds of young local cricketers scattered around grandstands. We even saw a few familiar faces in the Rizvi Springfield HS side. We got off to a great start, with Jack Nati leading the way with a quick 17 runs. These were continued on by Spencer White with a great opening knock of 54. Marcus Ridley with 27 runs and 18 runs from Alastair Weston all added to help our side end up with 7/170, a defendable score. The Rizvi Springfield HS was a strong side and were able to chase the total down at 6/171. A good spell from Avi Lath (2/23) was not enough to get our side over the line.

That night we went to the Mumbai Indians v. Royal Challengers Bangalore IPL game. We arrived at the stadium and made our way towards the giant roar of the crowd. As we walked in, the entire stadium erupted in a wave of blue, as Virat Kohli had just been dismissed. The amount of passion the supporters showed produced a great atmosphere within the stadium and was a great experience for our group.

The third match of the tour was at Police Gymkhana Cricket Academy. A smaller ground with a fast outfield meant a high scoring game. Batting first our touring side were able to make 5/237 after 40 overs. Another great performance from Spencer White (75no) and a solid innings from Felix Booth (45no) completed our innings.



A great all round bowling performance from the boys, including Nick Hook (3/30), saw a tight finish to the game. Unluckily a good innings from an opposition player saw the Gymkhana Cricket Academy win with 5 balls to go.

Day 8 of the tour saw match 4 commence at the rural Lakshya Cricket Ground in Bistrakh, Jaipur. Bowling first, a great all round performance from the boys saw the Udaipur Cricket Academy all out for 99 runs. Special performances from Tunks, Jennings and White. A good knock of 33 from Nick Hook as well as a quick 17 from Alastair Weston brought home the first win for the tour finishing the innings only 4 down.

The Elephant ride on day 9 of the tour at Amber Fort was definitely a highlight for many of the boys. The slow and rocky ascent was a new experience for many on the tour, including myself. Following the ride, our group had a quick tour of the Fort, walking through the three main sections, in awe of the amazing architecture and structures. After leaving the fort, we headed home in preparation for the IPL game that coming night.

The second IPL match of the tour was another great experience. Seated in a private Royal catered box at the Sawai Man Singh Stadium, the team were excited to watch some of the big names in today's game. A tight game, with a 50 run cameo from Steve Smith made for a great night, with the Rajasthan Royals coming out on top over the Mumbai Indians.

We recorded an excellent win in our fifth match on tour against Jayshree Periwal International School, a well-resourced private school in Mahapura, Rajasthan. Batting first, we piled on the runs to reach 6/277 off 40 overs, led by Tunks (73), Bartlett (72) and McFadden (56). In reply, JPIS could only manage 164 runs all out.

Day 11 included a long bus ride to Agra as well as an eye-opening visit to the Mother Teresa's Missionary of Charity, in which we experienced some of the struggles that the young children have had to endure throughout their life. This was a very confronting experience and really made me treasure the life I have here in Sydney.

After a short Tonga ride down a bumpy road, we arrived at the Taj Mahal. The sheer size of the structure is something amazing. It is hard to believe they were able to complete it in such a short amount of time (22 years). Every step we took within the marble building was breathtaking, the detail carved into the marble walls, the number of rooms and walkways as well as the people cleaning the dust off the marble using a cloth and water all added to the experience. One that will be remembered by all the touring group.

A good start to match 6 against the Yuvraj Singh Centre of Excellence had our team in a solid position, as our team took some early wickets and held some very good catches. A great performance from Vishal Bhatti (176 no off 77 balls) allowed the home team to reach 6/296 from 40 overs. A positive start from the opening pair got our side off to a flyer, allowing for Jack Nati (68) and Oliver Jennings (53) to create a good partnership through the middle overs. Although coming close, the home side had just enough runs, with our team falling 21 runs short.

Batting first against Aaradhya Sports Academy, our team was looking to finish the tour with a win. A good all-around batting performance from our side with stand out performances from Bartlett (61), Tunks (57), White (28), Hook (23no) and Booth (16no) allowed us to set a total of 6/247. A big performance from the bowling group including Oliver Jennings (4/21) allowed the team to finish them off in 23 overs for 88 runs. This was a great way to cap off an amazing tour for the boys.



A special thank you goes to Bruce Wood for putting together this amazing tour for all the players and supporters. The tour was extremely well organised which allowed the touring group to enjoy themselves and really experience the Indian culture.

Thanks also to the coaches, Rod Hokin and Josh Miller, not only for the amount of work they did on tour coaching and mentoring each player, but also for the work they did before the tour, in holding training sessions and helping the boys prepare for this wonderful tour.

The players also wish to sincerely thank their parents for funding the trip.

Supporters' report on the tour, compiled by Dean Weston (parent)

The day had finally arrived when our party of 27 players, coaches, manager and supporters set off on 12 April for a 15-day tour to the most fervent cricket loving country in the world. Our Head Coach, Rod Hokin, had travelled to India a week ahead of us to work with local coaches as a follow-up to his Cricket Australia High Performance (Level 3) accreditation training. Rod joined the group when we arrived, taking the total to 28 in the touring party.

We were warmly welcomed at our first destination, Mumbai International airport, by Sohan, our full-time, dedicated local escort, who was with us for the entire duration in India and with his team of experts, Nishita, Ganesh and Parveen, made Mumbai so interesting, real and unforgettable. The ever present Shobit took photographs and video at the sightseeing activities and cricket games (even from a drone and on the field during play!). Shobit's dedication and professionalism on tour was remarkable, given a family tragedy just days before our tour started.

The playing group was straight into it from Day 1 with a morning training session at the Al-Barkaat English School in Nerul, Mumbai, where they met their opponents for their first match the following day. The local boys, all dressed in their whites, were fascinated to train with and meet the visiting Australian players as they discussed



their favourite international players and compared respective skills. Following training we were taken to the famous Leopold Café for our first taste of local Indian fare, although Bruce ordered a strawberry milkshake!

Afterwards we visited the Gateway of India (see left), erected to commemorate the landing of King George V and Queen Mary in 1911 and now a gathering place for many local families / friends to socialise.

From the windows of our coach we witnessed automated rickshaws, motorbikes, mopeds, trucks, buses and even cows

compete for space on the roads. There is no concept of "giving way" on the roads or any apparent road rules! With a constant rumbling of vehicles with horns blasting, we were amazed that we never saw one accident happen. The bedlam of driving in Mumbai was matched only by the crowd noise at our first live IPL match between Mumbai Indians and Royal Challengers Bangalore. The capacity crowd was a mass of blue and fortunately our boys fitted in well, thanks to them all wearing genuine, imitation Mumbai Indians shirts purchased from a reputable merchant who sold them for 500 rupees (about A\$10) each, so the boys stocked up on many different IPL teams shirts.

A few parents braved a short walk from the hotel to a local beer merchant, an experience they'll never forget. While the players rested in our Mumbai hotel, the supporters, led by "Mat's Rebel Tour", arranged a side expedition to Kanheri Caves with our guide Rahil. What a character – a part-time Bollywood movie actor / director, tour guide



and shameless self-promoter. There are rock sculptures, carvings and more than 100 caves used by Buddhist monks a thousand years ago as a meeting and pilgrimage site. That evening we tested our knowledge with a cricket trivia quiz organised by Bruce.

Jaipur was our next stop and the adventurous supporters arranged a visit to the old city or "Pink City", famous for its trademark coloured buildings, surrounded by a wall with magnificent gates, containing numerous bazaars specialising in different crafts. We were confronted by eager shopkeepers, keen for us to spend our money in their shop at high prices and we learnt quickly to bargain. Several of the supporters left the market pleased with items purchased or with stunning henna tattoos, while others were just as pleased to have survived crossing the busy main road.

The whole touring party had a memorable sightseeing day in Jaipur accompanied by Sohan and our local guide Sahil. We visited the impressive Hawa Mahal palace and the Jal Mahal or “Water Palace” which appears to float in the middle of a lake. The highlight was the Amber Fort and its magnificent Palace a mix of Muslim and Hindu architecture with beautiful manicured gardens. The players bargained with the persistent sellers who pushed books, photos, colourful headgear, umbrellas and hand carved elephant figurines. The boys were skilled hagglers now, becoming equally as irritating, with some of the local sellers walking away for fear of losing money!

Our second IPL match was Rajasthan Royals v. Mumbai Indians in Jaipur. Here our allegiance changed to the local team, as the players wore their pink Rajasthan Royals shirts and we all cheered from our royal box seats for Steve Smith as he captained Rajasthan to victory, scoring a match-winning 59 no.

Our second last stop was Agra, a 5-hour coach trip from Jaipur. Upon arrival, after a brief lunch stop, the tour group visited Mother Teresa’s Missionaries of Charity – an orphanage of approximately 270 residents and staff of ten Sisters. This certainly put things into perspective and one could not come away unmoved by the circumstances of the children and humbled by the dedication of the Sisters who work there.



A tour highlight for all was most definitely the visit to the Taj Mahal escorted by Sahil. Made of white marble, inlaid with semi-precious stones, the location, grand scale, symmetry and detail was breathtaking. A second visit is a must in the future for those of us who sat on “Lady Diana’s Chair” only to find out afterwards, we posed for photos on a different bench to that famous photo from 1992 and should have sat on the bench on the other side of the water, nearer to the Taj Mahal! Photoshop maybe?

From Agra, another coach ride to Delhi and our final destination where the last two games were played. Noida Stadium, was particularly impressive (albeit unfinished), with a capacity of 25,000 where our final match, a great win, was played. The Tour ended off with dinner and an awards ceremony on our final night. This included presentation of trophies, medals, gifts for the players and supporters and the well deserved honours and speeches capped off a great night, a memorable Tour and incredible life experience for all involved. The next morning, we said goodbye to Sohan, who was a wonderful host and guide, nothing was too hard for him to arrange or sort out.

A special mention must go to Bruce for his tireless pre-planning, organisation and attention to detail without which, the Tour wouldn’t have been possible – a brilliant job. Equally noteworthy was the coaching and mentoring of Rod and Josh who spent most of their time looking after the players on and off the field with words of wisdom, guidance and encouragement. The effort of all the players impressed everyone as they improved all areas of their game during the tour and there is no doubt that this and the coaching, were responsible for the whole team improving markedly from game to game, winning 3 out of 7 and doing us all proud as they contended with the heat and humidity, while playing against very talented opposition and varying pitch conditions.



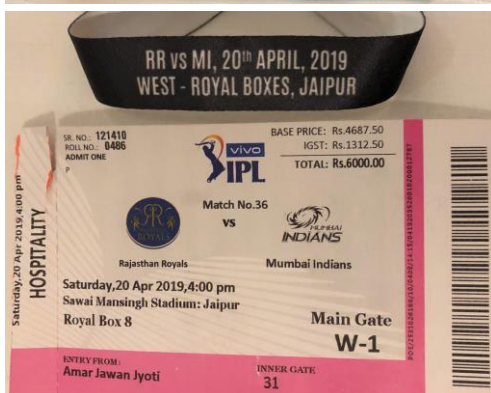
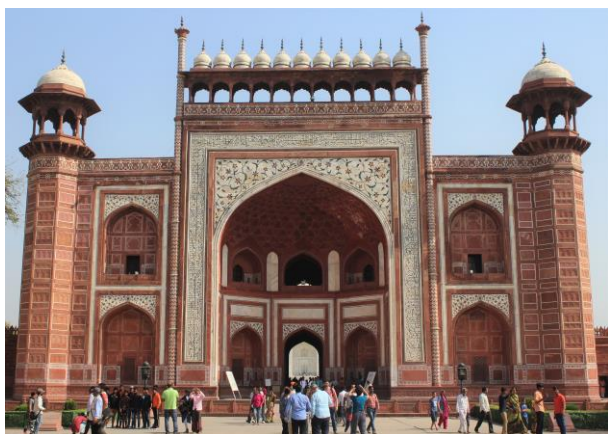

COACHES' ASSOCIATION (HKHDCCA)

Role, Functions & Objectives

The Coaches' Association is a leading cricket coaching organisation responsible for recruiting and accrediting young volunteer coaches from within HK&HDCA and north-western Sydney; and conducting junior cricket clinics during the school holidays and development programs in the off-season. HKHDCCA designs and implements coaching programs aimed at increasing the cricket participation, skills and enjoyment of boys and girls aged 5 – 15, including beginners, club players, representative standard players, and children with special needs.

We have experienced significant growth since our inception in 2010 and aim to continue to expand our subsidised (or free) coaching programs to a wider cross-section of the community, many of whom have encountered barriers or lack of opportunities to participate in cricket, including disadvantaged groups, children from non-English speaking communities, and children with special needs. The successful implementation of these challenging initiatives should assist in facilitating sporting, cultural and social inclusion for these communities, while also promoting healthy, active lifestyles and increasing the participation rate in cricket in NSW. Responsibilities include:

- raising the profile of coaching and giving coaches a collective 'voice' within the Association;
- promoting the objective that all club and representative coaches attain the Cricket Australia Community (Level 1) accreditation as a minimum (preferably Level 2 for representative Shield team coaches);
- conducting an annual Community (Level 1) accredited coaching course for HK&HDCA and NDCC members.
- organising cricket clinics at Waitara, West Pennant Hills, Dundas, Hornsby and/or Normanhurst, in partnership with Northern District CC, during the September / October and January school holidays for players aged 6 – 14;
- conducting an annual off-season Rising Stars Coaching Program for rep. standard players aged U/12 – U/15;
- implementing an annual off-season Rising Stars coaching program for U/9 – U/11 players in the Hornsby district during the Winter months, designed to fast-track their transition from soft to hard ball cricket;
- representing the Coaches' Association on all cricket coaching matters at the HK&HDCA Council and Executive Meetings (the President of the Coaches' Association is a delegate on the Executive Committee);
- providing active Coaches' Association members with professional coaching opportunities at our junior cricket clinics and our off-season junior development programs;
- co-ordinating the annual U/15 Ross Turner Cup (RTC) and U/13 Glenn Hourigan Cup (GHC) 'showcase' intra-Association representative fixtures, including the preliminary GHC T20 matches, in September each year;
- identifying potential outstanding young coaches and providing GHC coaching roles and other opportunities;
- recognising excellence in cricket coaching at club, representative or Coaches' Association levels through our HKHDCCA *Coach of Year* award (Bruce Wood Cup);
- arranging a HKHDCCA / NDCC overseas rep. cricket tour (U/15 age group) every couple of years since 2015;
- providing financial assistance to a limited number of HKHDCCA candidates nominated to attend a Cricket NSW accredited coaching course (Levels 1, 2 or 3);
- increasing the participation of girls in cricket, in consultation with the HK&HDCA Girls Cricket Co-ordinator, through targeted coaching programs and liaison with schools and clubs, and local junior Super 8 programs;
- conducting a free Beginners session, teaching cricket fundamentals to 'first time' players each year;
- assisting clubs by running some coaching sessions and demonstrating coaching drills to new club coaches;
- holding two free annual clinics each year for Blowfly cricketers (children with special needs) in January and September / October, plus ad-hoc coaching on Saturdays, depending on the availability of coaches;
- enhancing the development of accredited coaches and facilitating a future pathway for club and rep. coaches;
- providing a mentor service to coaches as required, especially new or young coaches seeking guidance;
- seeking corporate sponsorship and Government Grant opportunities to provide additional funding to expand and further subsidise our coaching programs, and purchase additional equipment as required;
- ensuring that all coaches aged 18 and over have a current *Working with Children* Check 5-year clearance;
- one-on-one (or small groups) private coaching on request, depending on the availability of suitable coaches;
- assisting the HK&HDCA Rep. Secretary with coaching matters relating to the representative program, including the provision of qualified coaches to rep. teams as required;
- aiming to provide cricket coaching for community groups from non-English speaking backgrounds who have encountered barriers or lack of opportunities to participate in cricket in Sydney.

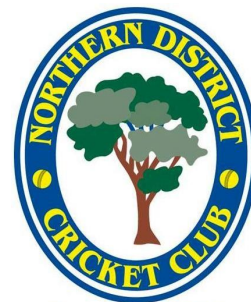

Indian tour an eye-opener

NORTHERN District Cricket Club's under-15 tour team have returned from their whirlwind trip to India as both better players and more worldly young men.

Organised with the Hornsby, Ku-ring-gai and Hills District Cricket Coaches Association, the 13-strong squad spent two weeks travelling throughout Mumbai, Jaipur, Agra and Delhi, playing seven matches against local representative teams.

Coaches Association president Bruce Wood said the team performed well throughout the two weeks, coming away with three wins and two losses.

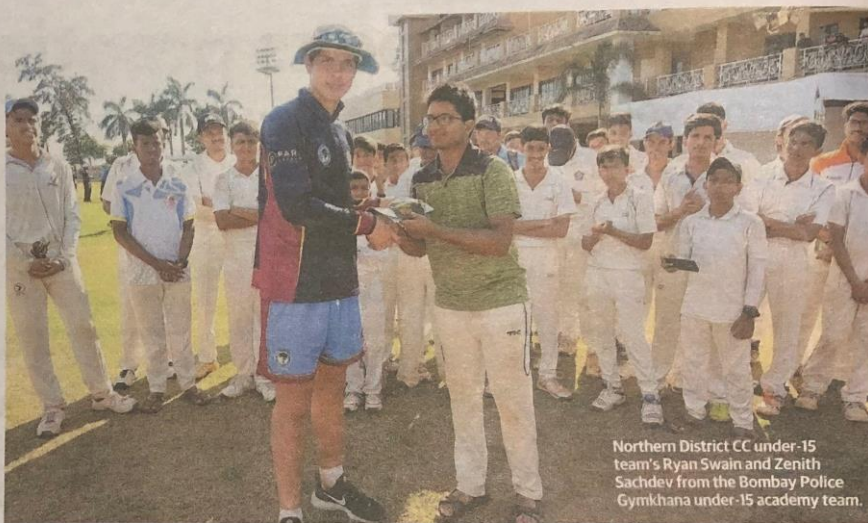
"Our team came up against some very talented Indian teams," Mr Wood said. "The best batsman on tour was Cameron Tunks, who scored 217 runs at a 54.2

average. The leading bowler was leg-spinner Oliver Jennings, who took nine wickets at a 10.4 average, and the top all-rounder was Spencer White who scored 195 runs at a 48.8 average and took seven wickets."

While the team showed a lot of growth on the field, it was their off-field activities that really opened their eyes.

"The team witnessed firsthand what an amazing country India is with its contrasting culture, classes and lifestyles," Mr Wood said. "The group visited Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity in Agra, an orphanage with 270 residents (people with disabilities, parentless or abandoned children) and a staff of 10 Sisters.

"This certainly put things into perspective and one could not come away unmoved by the circumstances of the children."

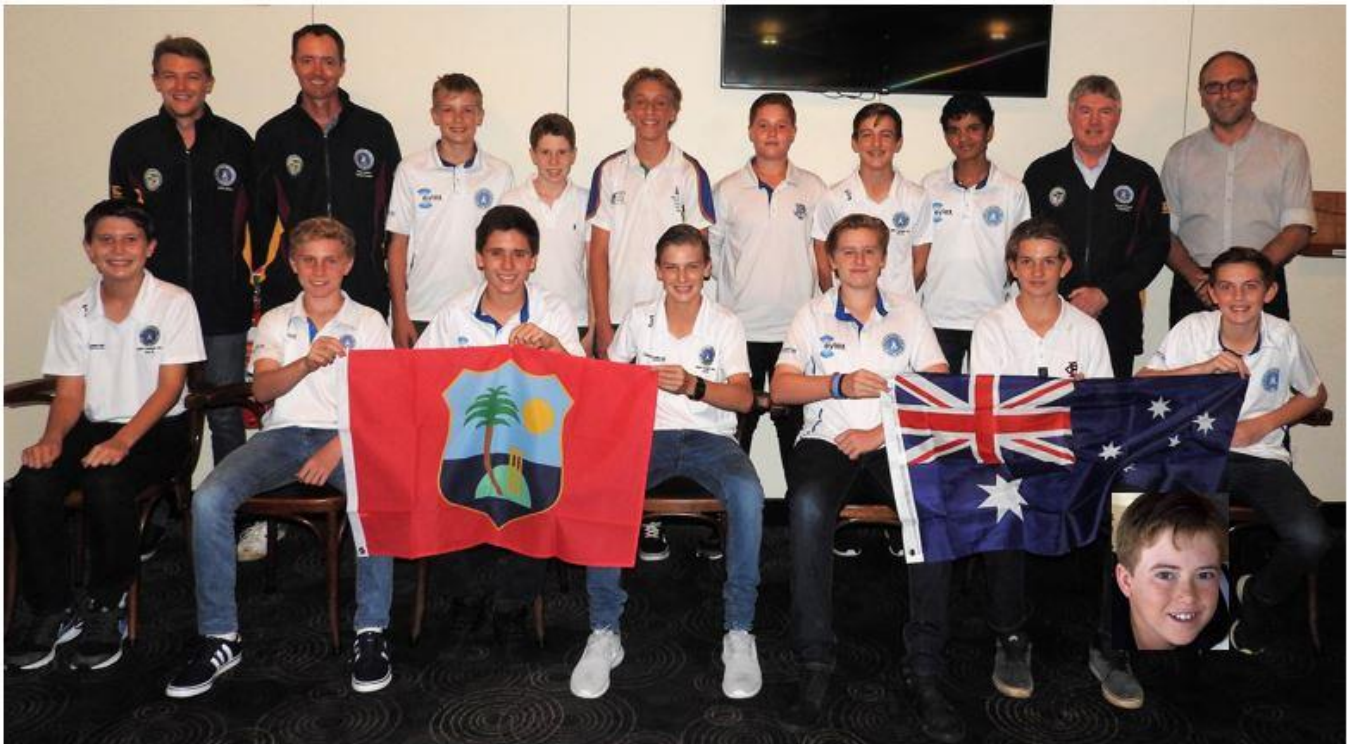

Flashback to HK&HDCA's U/15 tour to India in April 2006 – coached by Bruce Wood

The Hornsby Ku-ring-gai & Hills District Cricket Association (HK&HDCA) in Sydney sent an invitational U/15 representative team on a development tour to India from 16 – 30 April 2006. Bruce Wood was Head Coach on that tour 13 years ago and returned to India in April 2019 as Manager of the Coaches' Association / NDCC U/15 team.

The touring team in 2006 included some members of Hornsby's U/15 Weblin Shield 2005-06 premiership team. The Sydney team arrived in Bangalore and stayed at the National Cricket Academy, M. Chinnaswamy Test Stadium. Three matches were played against the Karnataka U/15 State team, which included two future Indian Test players, K. L. Rahul (opening batsman) and Karun Nair, who scored 303 no against England in 2016.

The Hornsby U/15 team was captained by Andrew Casey and included Liam Robertson, the current captain of Sydney University's First Grade team. The team travelled to Mumbai and played against the MIG Bandra Cricket Academy U/15 team, which included 16-year-old Ronan Tendulkar (Sachin's nephew), who scored 114 runs and took 3/31. The touring team travelled by coach to Pune and played against the Cadence Academy U/15 team and the Maharashtra U/15 State team, while staying at the beautiful Poona Cricket Club.

Our leading batsmen on that tour were Tom Gurka (264 runs @ 44.0 average), Liam Robertson (247 runs @ 35.3 ave.), and Daniel Wood (159 runs @ 26.5). Andrew Casey, Chris Aldersley and Alex Mihalyka also hit half-centuries on tour. Our bowling attack was led by Tom Gurka (13 wickets @ 15.1 ave.), off-spinner Taylor Paton (10 wickets @ 25.6), and Anuj Devalia (8 wickets @ 22.4, including a hat-trick). Dougal Robinson (w-k) had a great tour behind the stumps, snaring 18 dismissals (14 catches, 1 stumping & 3 run outs). Overall, the tour to India 13 years ago was a wonderful experience for all concerned, both on and off the cricket field.
