

COACHES' ASSOCIATION (HKHDCCA)

ROLE, FUNCTIONS AND OBJECTIVES

The **Coaches' Association** (HKHDCCA) is an inclusive NFP cricket coaching organisation responsible for recruiting and accrediting young coaches from within HK&HDCA and north-western Sydney; and conducting junior cricket clinics during the school holidays and development programs in the off-season. HKHDCCA designs and implements coaching programs aimed at increasing the cricket participation, skills and enjoyment of boys and girls aged 5 – 15, including beginners, club players, representative standard players, and children with special needs.



HKHDCCA has experienced significant growth since our inception in 2010 and aim to continue to expand our subsidised (or free) coaching programs to a wider cross-section of the community, many of whom have encountered barriers or lack of opportunities to participate in cricket, including disadvantaged groups, children from non-English speaking communities, and children with special needs. We also strongly support the growth of Girls' cricket at grassroots, club and representative levels. The successful implementation of these initiatives assists in facilitating sporting, cultural and social inclusion for these community groups, while also promoting healthy, active lifestyles, and increasing the participation rate in cricket in NSW. Responsibilities include:

- raising the profile of cricket coaching and giving coaches a collective 'voice' within the Association;
- promoting the objective that all club and representative coaches attain the Cricket Australia Community (Level 1) accreditation as a minimum, (preferably Level 2 for representative Shield team coaches);
- organising annual Community (Level 1) accredited coaching courses for HK&HDCA and NDCC members.
- organising cricket clinics for players aged 6 14 at Waitara, Cherrybrook, Normanhurst, West Pennant Hills and Hornsby, in partnership with Northern District CC, during the January, April, July and Sept./Oct. school holidays;
- representing the Coaches' Association on all cricket coaching matters at the HK&HDCA General and Executive Meetings (the President of the Coaches' Association is a delegate on the Executive Committee);
- providing active Coaches' Association members with professional coaching opportunities at our school holiday cricket clinics and other junior development programs;
- co-ordinating the annual HK&HDCA U/15 Ross Turner Cup (RTC) and U/13 Glenn Hourigan Cup (GHC) 'showcase' intra-Association representative fixtures;
- identifying potential outstanding young coaches; providing RTC & GHC coaching roles and other opportunities;
- recognising excellence in cricket coaching at club, representative or Coaches' Association levels through our HKHDCCA *Coach of the Year* award (Bruce Wood Cup);
- arranging representative cricket tours overseas for boys and/or girls, at least every two years (since 2015);
- providing financial assistance to a limited number of HKHDCCA candidates nominated to attend a Cricket NSW
 accredited coaching course (Levels 2 or 3), as Community (Level 1) courses are free;
- increasing the participation of girls in cricket, in consultation with Cricket NSW (Sydney Sixers) and the HK&HDCA Girls Cricket Co-ordinator, through targeted coaching programs and liaison with schools and clubs;
- conducting a free Beginners session, teaching cricket fundamentals to 'first time' players, on an annual basis;
- assisting clubs by running some coaching sessions and demonstrating coaching drills to new club coaches;
- holding free coaching sessions each year for BlowFly cricketers (children and adults with special needs), plus ad-hoc coaching at other programs, depending on the availability of our coaches; providing volunteer services at BlowFly Cricket fund-raising events and other programs;
- enhancing the development of accredited coaches and facilitating a future pathway for club and rep. coaches;
- providing a mentor service to coaches as required, especially new or young coaches seeking guidance;
- arranging Insurance for HKHDCCA and the annual incorporated association return to NSW Fair Trading;
- seeking corporate sponsorship and Government Grant opportunities to provide additional funding to expand and further subsidise our coaching programs, and purchase uniforms and additional equipment as required;
- ensuring that all coaches aged 18 and over have a current Working with Children Check 5-year clearance;
- promoting our activities and coaching programs via the Coaches' Association's social media (Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn and Twitter);
- assisting the HK&HDCA Rep. Secretary with coaching matters relating to the representative program;
- aiming to provide cricket coaching for community groups from non-English speaking backgrounds who have encountered barriers or lack of opportunities to participate in cricket in Sydney.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Bruce Wood OAM

The Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) had another successful year in 2023-24, as briefly summarised below.

School holiday junior cricket clinics (in partnership with Northern District CC) – The Coaches' Association conducted seven junior cricket clinics during the school holidays in 2023-24 at Mark Taylor Oval, Waitara (including the superb Indoor Centre), and Greenway 2 Oval, Cherrybrook. A total of 564 children attended the clinics, which averaged an impressive 80 boys and girls per clinic. The clinics cater for all cricket standards from beginners to representative standard players. The Coach / Players ratio across all our school holiday clinics in 2023-24 was an impressive 1 / 6.6, which provides plenty of individual coaching for the children. HKHDCCA presented its prestigious Phillip Hughes Medal at each clinic to recognise outstanding sportsmanship, teamwork, enthusiasm, performance and spirit of cricket.



<u>RTC and GHC</u> – The Coaches' Association co-ordinated the 26th annual U/15 Ross Turner Cup and the 21st U/13 Glenn Hourigan Cup 'showcase' matches, which took place on Sunday, 11-Feb-24 at Turramurra. HKHDCCA appointed two impressive RTC coaches – Connor Hindmarch and Will McFadden, plus two enthusiastic GHC coaches – Alex Fitzgerald and Riley McDowell. The RTC umpires were Bruce Wood OAM and Scott Reid, while the GHC umpires were Alf James OAM and Steve Williams. Both fixtures were high standard contests.

<u>ClubGRANTS Sponsorship</u> – HKHDCCA's strong partnership with Parramatta Leagues Club continued for an eighth year in 2023. The Coaches' Association thanks Parra Leagues for its generous support of our coaching and youth development programs. HKHDCCA holds committee meetings, dinners, social functions and tour reunions at Parramatta Leagues Club or the Vikings Sports Club at Dundas, which is owned by Parramatta LC.

<u>Head Coach</u> – HKHDCCA's inaugural Head Coach, Rod Hokin, has decided to stand down after 14 years of wonderful service (2010 – 2024). We thank Rod for his commitment, leadership, passion and expertise.

<u>AIWCA</u> – The Australia–India Women's Cricket Association (AIWCA) Inc. was formed in 2023 to provide opportunities for Australian female cricketers, primarily of Indian descent, to play high level representative cricket in Australia and on overseas tours. Bruce Wood was invited to lead this new organisation as President in its first year of operations to help set it up for future success. AIWCA partnered with HKHDCCA for our Girls tour to India.

<u>Girls Tour to India</u> – The Coaches' Association / AIWCA / Northern District CC held its first Girls overseas cricket tour when an U/17 team embarked on a memorable tour to India from 13 – 25 April 2024, playing 7 matches in Delhi and Jaipur, and visiting many cultural attractions, including the Taj Mahal in Agra.

<u>HKHDCCA Coach of the Year award (Bruce Wood Cup)</u> – Congratulations to James Makin (Kissing Point CC) for winning the *Coach of the Year* award in 2023-24.

<u>Other coaching awards</u> – The HKHDCCA President's Award was won by Connor Hindmarch; and the Rookie Coach Award was won by Ben Burrows. Elysa Oliveri won the AIS Sport - Volunteer of the Year award in 2023-24.

<u>Coach development</u> – HKHDCCA is pleased that five of our young coaches, Connor Hindmarch, Ryan Swain, Ben Randall, Elysa Oliveri & Aliya Colburt, completed the Cricket Australia Representative (formerly Level 2) accredited coaching course in 2023-24.

<u>Formal coaching courses</u> – HKHDCCA liaised with Cricket NSW and organised a Community (Level 1) accredited cricket coaching course, which was facilitated by Josh Miller at Barker College on 27-Aug-23 with 20 participants. Josh also ran a modified Community coaching course for BlowFly Cricket at MTO, Waitara on 12-Jan-24.

<u>BlowFly Cricket</u> – BlowFly Cricket celebrated its 15th anniversary at a gala dinner with 150 guests at Hornsby RSL on 14-June-24, which Bruce Wood attended on behalf of the Coaches' Association. HKHDCCA held a free coaching session for BlowFly Cricket on 24-Jan-24 in the Indoor Centre at MTO, Waitara. BlowFly Cricket is a wonderful organisation led by Mark Rushton (Founder / Treasurer) and Jordan Jones (President), that provides children and adults with special needs the opportunity to play a hybrid form of cricket, participate in entry-level coaching, and form social connections in the community.

Cricket NSW – Four HKHDCCA coaches regularly worked as Cricket Program Co-ordinators in schools, etc.

Sport NSW – Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) is an Associate Member of Sport NSW, the peak industry body.

Good Sports - The Coaches' Association retained its Level 3 accreditation under the Good Sports Program.

<u>Appreciation</u> – There are many people to thank for their strong support this season, including my colleagues on the Executive Committee – Rod Hokin (Head Coach), Josh Miller (Secretary), Braden Cheng (Vice-President) and Dylan Bish (Treasurer). Thanks also to our General Committee – Connor Hindmarch, Harrison Norrell, Corey Miller, Ryan Swain & Dani Chivers. Thanks to our five Patrons – Ross Turner, Mark Rushton, Denise Anderson, Alf James OAM and Matt Kean MP. Thanks to our dedicated coaches; Andrew Miedler (HK&HDCA President), Scott Reid (HK&HDCA Executive Officer), Jeremy Hook (NDCC President), Mike Langford (NDCC Vice-President), plus the HK&HDCA clubs and families that support our programs.

A total of **564** children attended the seven clinics, which averaged an impressive **80** boys and girls per clinic. The clinics cater for all cricket standards from beginners to representative standard players. The participants (aged between 5 and 14) receive plenty of group and individual coaching from experienced coaches, many of whom have played First Grade men's and women's cricket for Northern District CC. The Coach / Players ratio across all our school holiday clinics was an impressive 1 / 6.6, which would not be matched anywhere else in NSW for similar junior cricket clinics. Six of our senior coaches (Rod Hokin, Braden Cheng, Nick Miller, Corey Miller, Chris Burnett & Harrison Norrell) had the opportunity to perform the role of Head Coach at our school holiday clinics in 2023-24.

The coaches did a terrific job, helping the youngsters develop their skills through coaching drills and games-based activities. The clinics included a wide range of activities for the boys & girls, including video analysis of the bowlers' actions. The players were placed in small groups in line with their age, ability and friendship groups, and received specialist coaching on batting, shot selection, pace & spin bowling, catching, throwing, wicket-keeping; tactics / game-awareness, match preparation, captaincy, fitness and training in the nets. The players benefited from a variety of age-specific coaching drills, concluding with Super 8 matches on the oval to reinforce the cricket skills learnt, develop teamwork and introduce a competitive but friendly element to the games.

We were delighted that **Chris Green** (Sydney Thunder captain; NSW Blues rep.; NDCC First Grader) was able to attend as our special guest at MTO on 24-Jan-2024. We thank all the HK&HDCA affiliated clubs for their strong support in promoting these popular clinics amongst their junior teams. The Coaches' Association and Northern District CC received very positive feedback from the parents and players who attended these cricket clinics.

The Coaches' Association held a 'MasterClass' session at 6 of the 7 school holiday cricket clinics to inspire the children and to demonstrate their coaches' cricket skills. The 'MasterClass' batters featured at our 2023-24 clinics were Cam Tunks (3 clinics), Corey Miller (2 clinics) & Nick Hook (1 clinic), all NDCC First and Second Graders.

ROSS TURNER CUP

26th Annual Match

HK&HDCA's showcase junior representative match called the Ross Turner Cup (RTC) has been held since 1998-99 and features the outstanding players in our district from the U/15 age group and below. The Founder of the annual RTC contest (and the U/13 Glenn Hourigan Cup fixture) was (the late) **Tom Richmond** OAM, Life Member of HK&HDCA, Coaches' Association & Northern District CC, who passed the responsibility to **Bruce Wood**, President, Coaches' Association, in 2010-11.

One of the objectives of the RTC fixtures was the early identification of players with talent and commitment, to provide high level coaching and development



opportunities for these players. It was hoped that many of them would successfully progress through the HK&HDCA Shield junior representative teams; play AW Green Shield and Grade Cricket with Northern District CC; or A Grade within the HK&HDCA Senior Competition.

The Cup is named in honour of **Ross Turner** (pictured above), one of our Association's finest products. As a young player, Ross was a brilliant all-rounder who bowled leg-spin, batted beautifully (left-handed) and was without peer in the field. He played for Pennant Hills CC, HK&HDCA junior representative teams and later became a specialist batsman and Northern District's most successful captain, winning two First Grade premierships in 1985-86 and 1986-87. Ross was voted as the First Grade Captain of the Year by the Sydney Cricket Association on three occasions. He worked for Cricket NSW and Cricket Australia, pioneering development activities, before being appointed by the International Cricket Council (ICC) in 1998 as its initial Global Development Manager. He was based at Lords (in London) and facilitated the development of cricket in nations such as Bangladesh, Nepal, China, Malaysia, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Uganda, Afghanistan, Ireland, Canada, Denmark and Netherlands. Ross is now the Director of Cricket at Newington College and the Convenor of GPS cricket in Sydney.

HK&HDCA thanks its sponsor, Kookaburra Sport (Cameron Eve), for supplying the match balls, stumps, and the Player of the Match awards for the RTC and GHC matches each year. The partnership between HK&HDCA and Kookaburra Sport started in 2003-04, so it has extended for over 20 years.

The 26th RTC match took place on Sunday, 11th February 2024 at Turramurra Oval, adjacent to the U/13 Glenn Hourigan Cup match at Karuah Park. Refer to the historical RTC Programs at this link: <u>https://bit.ly/RTC-reports</u>

UMPIRES FOR ROSS TURNER CUP MATCH

Scott Reid is the Executive Officer (and Life Member) of HK&HDCA; and a former President of the Umpires' Association (HKHDCUA). He has umpired over 200 matches for HKHDCUA since 1998-99, plus four NSWDCA / NSWYC Shield Finals; the Final of the NSW Schools Championship Cup in November 2019; five RTC and two GHC fixtures. Scott is in his 33rd season as a player for Beecroft CC in the HK&HDCA competitions, starting in the U/16s back in 1985-86. He served 10 seasons on both the Association's Executive and Senior Competition Committee between 1994-95 to 2004-05. Scott jointly holds (with Adam Nash – 329) the HK&HDCA record for the highest partnership for any wicket in any Senior grade – 7th wicket, 427 runs in the B Reserve Grade Final at Parklands Oval in 1990-91 (Scott scored 212 no in a team total of 725). Scott has scored over 9 500 runs in senior cricket including seven centuries and 49 half-centuries: won



over 9,500 runs in senior cricket, including seven centuries and 49 half-centuries; won four Association batting awards, and played in seven HK&HDCA premiership teams.

Bruce Wood OAM received an Order of Australia Medal in 2022 for his service to cricket. He was recognised by Cricket NSW and Cricket Australia as the *Community Match Official of the Year* at the national 'A Sport For All' Awards in 2020; and featured in the Cricket Sydney publication: bit.ly/BGW-Cricket-Oct-2020. Bruce has been a member of the HK&HDCA Executive Committee since 2007; President of the Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) since 2010; RTC / GHC Convenor since 2010; Hon. Umpires' Co-ordinator for the Associated Schools of NSW (CAS) since 2017. He was also elected as the inaugural President of the Australia–India Women's Cricket Association (AIWCA) in 2023. He is an experienced Representative (Level 2) accredited coach, having coached school, club, rep. and touring teams since 1997-98, including HK&HDCA's undefeated U/15 Weblin Shield Boys premiership team in 2005-06. He was Head Coach on HK&HDCA's



first overseas tours to India in 2006, and New Zealand in 2007. He was the Manager (and umpire) on the HKHDCCA U/15 Boys tours to Sri Lanka (2015); West Indies (2017); India (2019); and India (2023). The Association's prestigious *Coach of the Year* perpetual trophy (Bruce Wood Cup) is named in his honour in recognition of his exemplary work and achievements in the field of cricket coaching over more than two decades. Bruce is an experienced NSWCUSA Level 2 qualified umpire who has officiated in over 770 matches since 2001-02, including 60+ Grand Finals (one at the SCG and one at Bradman Oval, Bowral). He is a respected Life Member of four cricket bodies – HK&HDCA; Coaches' Association; Barker CC & Normanhurst-Warrawee CC. Bruce jointly holds the HK&HDCA record for the highest 5th wicket batting partnership in any Senior grade – 320* runs set in 2000-01 for Normanhurst-Warrawee CC (he scored 138 no at Normanhurst Oval).

GLENN HOURIGAN CUP

21st Annual Match

HK&HDCA's Glenn Hourigan Cup (GHC) contest began in 2003-04 following the success of the annual U/15 Ross Turner Cup (RTC) fixture, which was inaugurated in 1998-99 to promote an opportunity for our best junior players to appear in a 'showcase' game of high level representative standard cricket. GHC was initially an U/12 contest, however was changed to U/13 in 2010-11. Tom Richmond OAM was the Founder of the GHC (and RTC) matches, and he passed the responsibility to Bruce Wood, President, Coaches' Association, in 2010-11.



Glenn Hourigan (pictured left) was the Association's

Representative Secretary from 1988 to 2001. During that period, HK&HDCA won the U/19 Durham Shield twice, the Martin Shield, the U/15 Weblin Shield and the Girls' U/14 representative competition. He also held the roles of Assistant Organising Secretary for HK&HDCA Juniors (1987-88); and Grounds Officer (2000-01). Glenn's connection with the Association began when his son was playing, however continued long afterwards. His contribution to rep. cricket within our Association was enormous, covering our participation in all NSWDCA Shield competitions. He also championed the entry of 'development' representative teams in the IDCA competitions when he was delegate to IDCA from 1988 to 2001.


Glenn was involved in numerous coaching initiatives, including the significant *Northern Cricket* programs that led the way many years ago. He contributed massively to organising competent coaching and management of our inter-district representative teams. He was also an enthusiastic supporter of the girls' cricket competitions that were emerging at the time. Glenn was always concerned about the need for all players to be given the maximum of opportunity and a "fair go", both in representative selection trials and in matches. He held the view that if we can do this for the young players, the rest is up to them. He always had a soft spot for the "battler" and encouraged cricket development at all levels of ability. Glenn was a constant voice for the development of young players as a means of securing the future of this great game of ours. He saw cricket as part of the Australian way of life and a basic right in this country for all young people.

No-one has ever taken greater pride in our Association or worked harder for its representative teams than Glenn. For his services to cricket, Glenn was awarded HK&HDCA Life Membership (# 38) in 1997; and was a recipient of the Australian Sports Medal in 2000. Glenn was proud that this 'showcase' U/13 annual fixture was played for a cup that carries his name. Sadly, Glenn passed away on 3 May 2023 (aged 79). ROD HOKIN – HEAD COACH (2010 – 2024)

We wish to pay tribute to our Head Coach, **Rod Hokin**, who has decided to stand down from the role after 14 years of wonderful volunteer service on our Executive Committee. Rod is a Cricket Australia High Performance (Level 3) accredited cricket coach and Life Member of the Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA), who has led our team of coaches superbly since our inception in 2010. He has also been an inspirational Head Coach at so many of our school holiday junior cricket clinics over the years, as well as three U/15 Boys overseas cricket tours to Sri Lanka (2015), Barbados (2017) and India (2019).





Rod provided the following summary of his reflections on the role.

14 years as Head Coach of the Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) has provided many wonderful experiences and plenty of lifelong memories. I was playing cricket in Ireland when I received an email from Bruce Wood asking me to be the inaugural Head Coach of the Coaches' Association. I loved the concept and the vision that Bruce had for the

Association, so I decided to say yes. At the time, I had reached almost a decade of playing cricket overseas, and I was unsure where the rest of my career would take me. I had an Engineering degree as well as a teaching qualification behind me. Little did I know, that by saying "Yes", I was one step closer to a full-time career in cricket.

The vision of Bruce was to provide a pathway for coaches who loved the game and related well with As he said, "rather than working at children. Macca's and flipping burgers", HKHDCCA provided casual employment opportunities for those who were passionate about cricket coaching and keen to learn and develop their skills. In the early years, the Coaches' Association expanded quickly. The initial Summer Coaching Clinics (with subsidised fees) proved to be very popular and the numbers steadily increased to become regularly 'Sold Out'. A Winter development program soon commenced with sessions held on Sundays, focusing on the overall development of players under 10. This graduated to specific development of older players with specialist sessions focusing on batting, pace bowling, spin bowling and wicket-keeping. These early years provided wonderful professional development for our coaches as we all learned from each other in a variety of areas. I still remember vividly, the passion of the late Tom Richmond OAM as he led one of the leg-spin coaching sessions.



In 2014, I spoke with Bruce about the potential of an overseas tour so we could continue to coach and mentor many of the up-and-coming players in the region in a more match specific environment. Bruce loved the idea, and with his outstanding management and organisational skills, a year later we were in Sri Lanka with an U/15 squad. The tour was outstanding, and it is so pleasing now to see two of those players, Baxter Holt and Sam Fanning, achieving their dreams of playing professional cricket. As a coach, sitting in the grandstand at Galle Test stadium and watching Baxter score a magnificent century (154), was certainly a highlight of the tour. Two years later (2017), we would be back on tour but this time in Barbados. It was certainly one of my most memorable and enjoyable times overseas.





From Disneyland and Universal Studios in LA to the catamaran cruise in the West Indies, this tour certainly had plenty of wonderful memories. A young Lachlan Shaw, who had been part of our inaugural U/10 Winter program, would show on the field the skills that would lead him to a professional career in the game. Our 2019 India tour was also a highlight. The country is a must for anyone who loves cricket. From the highly competitive matches on the field, to the Taj Mahal, and an IPL match, the tour provided an unforgettable experience!

The Head Coach role has enabled me to make some wonderful connections and lifelong friends. Bruce Wood is certainly the central figure for the Coaches' Association and his contribution has been immense. Josh Miller has been one of our leading coaches and it has been great to form a friendship

with him and see him now also progress into a full-time career in cricket. Will Fielder provided plenty of wonderful memories and plenty of banter on the Sri Lanka tour in 2015, as well as at numerous coaching sessions. Nick Miller is an outstanding coach, and it is pleasing to now work alongside him at The King's School. There have been plenty more coaches who have been great to connect with and learn from over the years.

My decision to step down as Head Coach is partly due to me wanting a younger coach to have the opportunity to lead and develop, just as I have over the past 14 years. I am now fortunate to have a full-time career in cricket and I still enjoy coaching as much as ever. Currently, my most challenging coaching of the week is certainly leading the U/10 team that my youngest son plays for! As a father to 3 boys, I know the wonderful life-changing role that a good coach can have in a player's



development. Hopefully, over the past 14 years, I have assisted a few young boys and girls on their journey.



GIRLS U/17 TOUR TO INDIA - APRIL 2024

The Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) organised a Girls U/17 representative cricket tour to northern India from 13 – 25 April 2024, playing 7 matches (3 x T20, 3 x 40 overs, 1 x 35 overs) in Delhi and Jaipur, as well as visiting several major cultural attractions, including the Taj Mahal in Agra. The tour was organised in partnership with the Australia–India Women's Cricket Association (AIWCA), and Northern District CC. The three officials on tour were **Ron** 'Tiger' **Woods** (Head Coach), **Bruce Wood** OAM (Manager), and **Sue Gregory** (Girls Co-ordinator / Umpire). Our touring party comprised 14 players, 3 officials and 9 family supporters (total 26 people).



Our experienced Indian travel agents were Sohan Kadian and Nikita Rathore from Melsh Sports Tours (Delhi) <u>www.melshsportstours.com</u>, who looked after us so well on previous tours to India in 2019 and 2023.

The 14 players selected to tour play in the SCA Women's competition, the majority play in the U/18 Brewer Shield competition (8 with NDCC), while a few of the more experienced players had some Second Grade experience, with one player (Aimee) having completed her first season in women's First Grade NSW Premier Cricket in Sydney.

This was a development tour for our female players, whose ages ranged from 14 to 17. Head Coach, Ron Woods, advised the players at the start that the success of the tour would not be measured by our Win / Loss ratio, but by our team's effort, commitment, teamwork, improvement and ability to adapt to the different conditions. Our players learnt so much from the talented Indian players, many of whom train twice a day in large cricket academies. The pitch surfaces in Delhi and Jaipur were very different to the grass pitches in Australia. Pleasingly, our players improved each match as they became accustomed to the rolled dirt pitches and the heat.

At the end of our fifth match against the KT Cricket Academy at Aravali Cricket Ground, Jaipur, Hathoj, Rajasthan, we saw **Steve Waugh**, who was taking photos of cricket matches in India. His manager took a photo of Steve with our team and posted it on his social media pages, which was a thrill for the girls and story to relay to the folks back home.



On a rest day, we visited the Ladli Vocational Training Centre for orphaned and abandoned children in Jaipur (see photo below), which was both inspiring and heartbreaking. The young children are housed, educated and protected at this amazing centre, which relies on donations and mostly volunteers to survive. After participating in some craft making, our players joined a dance class in an adjacent room, which was enjoyed by all. One of our parents, Yash Swarup, popped out of the orphanage and generously bought some snacks and drinks for the children, which was a nice gesture.



In the afternoon on Day 9 (Sunday, 21 April), our touring party had a memorable tour of the palace section of the vast Amer Fort in Jaipur, which has beautiful views over the valleys and hills. Some of the historic buildings there are around 1,000 years old! Our touring party had earlier enjoyed shopping in the traditional Bazaars in Jaipur.

NORTHERN DISTRICT CRICKET CLUB

Northern District CC (NDCC) is delighted to be associated with the Coaches' Association (HKHDCCA) in the conduct of the popular school holiday junior cricket clinics (majority at Mark Taylor Oval, Waitara), and with the junior development tours overseas. This year's exciting U/17 Girls tour to India followed the highly successful U/15 Boys tours to India in 2019 & 2023; West Indies in 2017; and Sri Lanka in 2015. These tours have delivered great results for players, who are challenged in difficult foreign conditions. Tours of this kind tend to highlight and speed up the progress of talented players, even if that's not obvious until after the tour itself. Moreover, they build camaraderie and friendship, which helps in all manner of ways, on and off the field.



NDCC was established in 1925 and is based at MTO, Waitara. It is the northernmost of the 20 clubs that form the Sydney Cricket Association (SCA) and develop players to represent NSW and its T20 franchises, Sydney Thunder and Sydney Sixers. NDCC is the Club of former international players such as Peter Taylor, Brad Haddin, Adam Gilchrist & Neil Harvey and currently has Stella Campbell and Nathan Lyon in the playing ranks. It has a growing female playing base, having operated as an integrated club since 2005. NDCC won the Women's Premier Cricket First Grade premiership in 2020-21 (runners-up in 2022-23). Lauren Smith plays for Sydney Thunder in the WBBL T20 national competition and many former players such as Sam Bates and Katie Mack are representing at first class level interstate. Last summer, Grace Dignam was NSW Women's Premier Cricketer of the Year (and Captain of the Merit XI) in a high-performing season which led to a contract to play with ACT. We are proud to say that we have more female players in the NSW pathways programs than any other Premier club.

In 2022-23, we saw Chris Green and Toby Gray make their NSW Sheffield Shield debuts, while Ross Pawson played his first BBL match for Sydney Thunder. Chris Green, captain of Sydney Thunder, made his T20 international debut for Australia in 2023. Former HKHDCCA West Indian tourist, Lachy Shaw, has a Cricket NSW Rookie Contract and is a member of the Sydney Sixers squad. NDCC Men's First Grade team were Limited-Overs champions in 2022-23 and 2023-24, winning the first final at Cricket Central, Silverwater (NSW headquarters). NDCC is a high achiever within Sydney cricket, having won back-to-back Club Championships in 2020-21 and 2021-22. NDCC is also regarded as a club that "plays the right way" – twin Spirit of Cricket Awards in those Club Championship years is a testament to that.

The Club is excited to have opened (in February 2023) the Mark Taylor Oval (MTO) Indoor Cricket Centre, adjacent to the oval named after our most famous former player. A new playing surface for the oval and new turf training nets will be ready for action in 2024-25, while work on a new multi-purpose pavilion and scoreboard is expected to commence in 2024. The 99-year-old ground is in the process of being turned into a modern Centre of Excellence and will become a hub for cricket in Sydney's north. A big Centenary is being planned for NDCC in 2025. At NDCC, we enjoy welcoming players to the Club early in their cricketing journey. We enjoy making new friends as well, and the Club has friends all over the world. We look forward to welcoming you to MTO soon.



The close working relationship between the Coaches' Association

(HKHDCCA) and BlowFly Cricket originated and continues to prosper through the long-standing friendship between Mark Rushton and Bruce Wood. Mark and Bruce previously worked together on the HK&HDCA Executive Committee where they are both Life Members, and they seized the opportunity in 2011 for their two organisations to collaborate for mutual benefit of special needs children, junior cricket and the community.

The BlowFly cricketers play modified cricket on Saturday afternoons at James Park, Hornsby during Terms 4 and 1 (cricket season), followed by a family BBQ.
